SUPPORTING PUBLIC SAFETY IN THE COMMUNITY.**

CSOSA'S CJAN NETWORK

CSOSA's Associate Director Thomas Williams explained that since the creation in 1997, and its certification as an independent federal agency on August 5th, 2000 the Court Services and Offender Supervision Agency (CSOSA) has been implementing a community-based approach to offender supervision in the District of Columbia. Contrary to past models of community supervision in DC, CSOSA's approach to community supervision is grounded in the idea that public safety is our most important outcome. To support the concept of public safety, we have established better accountability among offenders by having a greater presence in the community to ensure swift and fair responses to offender non-compliance. CSOSA provides pre-sentence reports to the judiciary, and post-sentence reports for felony convicted offenders to the Bureau of Prison to assist in the designation process.

CSOSA has established nine community offices that utilize sophisticated geographic mapping to ensure that the individuals that are being supervised receive guidance and support in the neighborhoods where they live. CSOSA supervises via kiosk, direct contact, drug surveillance, electronic monitoring, and /or a combination of these methods. Kiosk-oriented supervision is for individuals that have not demonstrated a high risk to the community. Electronic monitoring style of supervision/intervention is de-

signed to monitor the movements of individuals that presented behavior that deem them a greater risk to public safety, or possibly utilized as a motivational tool to comply with supervision standards. If you've seen a transmitter trapped around someone's ankle, it is a good bet that they are being electronically monitored by any one of five agencies that utilize this tool.

CSOSA's manager of the Electronic Monitoring Unit,

Jessica Hines, explained its use and effectiveness extremely well in the April 28th, CJAN Forum. A person's exact location, speed of travel, facsimile to churches, schools, and business can be viewed in real time. This tool has crime prevention benefits, crime solving potential, and a great motivator for an individual to want to do the right thing while on supervision. All CJAN members enjoyed the presentation.
