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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: MISSION

Part E.1 – Executive Summary: Mission

Introduction

Pursuant to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission's Management Directive 715 (MD-715), the Court Services and Offender Supervision Agency for the District of Columbia (CSOSA) and the Pretrial Services Agency for the District of Columbia (PSA), an independent entity within CSOSA, present this report which assesses the progress made toward establishing a model equal employment opportunity (EEO) program in Fiscal Year (FY) 2022. Throughout this report, CSOSA and PSA will be referred to collectively as the Agency but will also be referred to individually as appropriate. The Agency's Annual EEO Program Status Report highlights its accomplishments and efforts to identify and eliminate barriers to the equitable treatment of all employees within the Agency and reaffirms its commitment to ensuring equal employment opportunity and promoting workforce diversity.

In FY 2022, the Agency's operations continued to be impacted by the national pandemic caused by COVID-19. The Agency continued with a significant level of enhanced telework for its workforce, consistent with the guidance of the Office of Personnel Management and the Safer Federal Workforce Task Force. Notwithstanding the challenges COVID-19 continued to present, the Agency made progress in meeting its goals and objectives in maintaining a model EEO program as detailed below.

The Office of Equal Employment Opportunity, Diversity, and Special Programs

The Office of Equal Employment Opportunity, Diversity, and Special Programs (EEO Office) provides leadership, direction, and guidance carrying out the Agency's EEO program. The EEO Office ensures compliance with federal nondiscrimination employment laws, regulations, and executive orders. EEO continues to be a top priority with leadership by recognizing that building and supporting a diverse and talented workforce is critical to the Agency's mission.

Agency's Mission and Mission Related Functions

The Agency was established by Congress to consolidate parole, probation, supervised release, and pretrial functions for the District of Columbia under a single federal executive branch agency. CSOSA provides community supervision to adult offenders on probation, parole, and supervised release in the District of Columbia. Its mission is to increase public safety, prevent crime, reduce recidivism, and support the fair administration of justice in close collaboration with the community. PSA's mission is to promote pretrial justice and enhance community safety. PSA assists judicial officers in making appropriate release decisions and provides supervision and pro-social interventions to defendants released into the community before trial.

The Agency's FY 2022 summary of the Annual EEO Program Status Report outlines the progress the Agency made towards achieving a model EEO program; identifies program deficiencies and barriers to achieving such a program; and sets forth the planned actions designed to address and/or eliminate the program deficiencies and barriers. The Agency is confident that, by continuing the progress outlined in

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this report, the Agency will reach our goal of operating a model EEO program as envisioned by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC).

The MD-715 divides the essential elements of a model agency EEO program into the six broad categories reflected below:

- -- Demonstrated Commitment from Agency Leadership;
- --Integration of EEO into the Agency's Strategic Mission;
- -- Management and Program Accountability;
- -- Proactive Prevention of Unlawful Discrimination;
- --Efficiency; and
- --Responsiveness and Legal Compliance.

These six elements serve as the organizing principles by which the Agency can assess and improve its EEO program. Accordingly, the Agency reviewed its EEO and personnel programs, policies, and performance in light of these elements to identify areas where the EEO program has made progress and those where it can become more effective. The major initiatives implemented in FY 2022 and planned for FY 2023 are listed below.

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Essential Element A: Demonstrated Commitment from Agency Leadership

The Agency is dedicated to the principles of EEO and maintaining a successful EEO program. This commitment is evident at all levels of the Agency, including at the senior executive, management, and employee levels. Demonstration of this commitment includes, but is not limited to, activities that help maintain an environment free from discrimination, harassment, and retaliation.

The Director of CSOSA and the Director of PSA issued a joint EEO and Diversity Policy Statement on September 30, 2022. In this statement, the Directors reaffirmed their commitment to promoting diversity and inclusion and ensuring equal employment opportunity for every employee and applicant for employment. The statement also outlined avenues of redress for filing EEO complaints.

In furtherance of that commitment, the EEO Office, CSOSA's Office of Human Resources (OHR), CSOSA's Senior Executive Leadership Team (SELT), PSA's Office of Human Capital Management (OCHM) and PSA's Leadership Team continued to be involved in the recruitment, promotion, and hiring processes in various ways. OHR, OHCM, and EEO continued their collective work on developing a strategic recruitment plan to promote greater diversity and better reach those groups that have been identified as being underrepresented in the Agency's workforce.

In FY 2022, the Agency continued to use its Special Act monetary award entitled "The Diversity and Inclusion Award" to recognize employees who successfully promoted diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility and demonstrated superior accomplishment in EEO. Additionally, the EEO Office recognized EEO Counselors and the members of the Special Emphasis Programs, all of whom performed these duties on a collateral basis, with Special Act awards in FY 2022.

Essential Element B – Integration of EEO into the Agency's Strategic Mission

CSOSA's core mission is to increase public safety, prevent crime, reduce recidivism, and support the fair administration of justice in close collaboration with the community. PSA's mission is to promote pretrial justice and community safety by assisting judicial officers in making appropriate release decisions, and by providing supervision and pro-social interventions to defendants released into the community. The Agency is committed to developing and maintaining a highly-skilled, diverse, and engaged workforce as the Agency appreciates how critical such a workforce is to accomplishing its missions.

Additionally, the Agency is committed to the integration of EEO into several critical areas of management including, but not limited to, the following:

Reporting Structure: The EEO Director continued to have appropriate authority and resources to effectively carry out a successful EEO program. The EEO Director continued to provide technical guidance in the implementation of EEO programs, including action plans in accordance with MD-715 guidance. During FY 2022, the Director reported directly to CSOSA's Director and continued to have direct access to the Director of PSA.

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<u>Communication</u>: The annual MD-715 report, covering the Agency's FY 2021 accomplishments, planned activities, and strategies, was posted on the Agency's intranet as well as its public website domain found at <u>www.csosa.gov</u>. Once finalized, the annual report for FY 2022 will be posted in both locations as well.

<u>Special Emphasis Programs</u>: In FY 2022, the Agency's Special Emphasis Programs (SEPs) continued to operate in an entirely virtual environment. The SEPs continued to support equal opportunities throughout the Agency including during various points within the employment life cycle such as recruitment, hiring, advancement, training, and promotions.

The SEPs played a vital role in educating and increasing understanding about issues of particular importance to the various SEPs and employees in general. For example, in June 2022, the Agency's Special Observance Committee (SOC) organized the Agency's second annual celebration of Pride Month. This celebration included a week dedicated to educating staff about the importance of appropriate pronouns, a week dedicated to providing support as well sharing information about programs and resources available to staff and/or their loved ones who identify as LGBTQ+, and a week dedicated to sharing information about resources and programs available to the members of the LGBTQ + community who the Agency supervises. The celebration of Pride Month culminated with the launch of the Agency's first LGBTQ+ Special Emphasis Group.

In the face of the 339% increase in violence against the Asian and American Pacific Islander (AAPI) community since 2021, the Agency's Asian and Pacific American Committee (APAC) continued to educate employees about the history of violence against and its impact on the AAPI community. The APAC also shared with employees a powerful video about the solidarity between African Americans and members of the AAPI community in fighting against violence. In addition, the APAC informed employees of ways to intervene safely as an ally in the face of violence.

By engaging and working with SEPs, the Agency continued to raise employee awareness about the importance of EEO, diversity, equality, inclusion, and accessibility while demonstrating the Agency's commitment to a model EEO workplace.

With respect to the Federal Employee Viewpoint Survey (FEVS) for FY 2022, the Agency's score as it related to the Inclusion Quotient (IQ) Index continued to equal or exceed the government-wide score. The survey was posted on the Agency's intranet.

Essential Element C – Management and Program Accountability

In support of the Agency's priority to empower management staff to embrace their roles as leaders and champions of diversity and inclusion, the Agency required its leadership and supervisors to participate in a series of courses intended to assist them in further developing their ability to lead and manage an increasingly diverse and inclusive workplace. Additionally, the Agency continued to provide employment development opportunities to its employees in its efforts to attract and engage a diverse and effective workforce. For example, in FY 2022, the Agency afforded employees detail assignment

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opportunities within the Agency to allow them to expand their knowledge and skill sets and to significantly assist the Agency's efforts to retain and train members of its diverse workforce.

Both CSOSA's Training and Career Development Center (TCDC) and PSA's Training and Career Development Unit (TCDU) provided mandatory training courses in the areas of EEO, sexual harassment prevention, and the No FEAR Act. The Agency continued providing training on its new Anti-Harassment policy and procedures in its New Employee Orientation. In addition, the Agency continued to incorporate diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility principles into its New Employee Orientation. New Employee Orientation also included a review of Executive Order 14035, Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility (DEIA) in the Federal Workplace, (and the definitions included therein), a discussion of how DEIA principles are embedded into the Agency's culture and operations, and provided examples of how DEIA principles are applied in different scenarios.

Essential Element D – Proactive Prevention of Unlawful Discrimination

The Agency continued its proactive efforts to prevent unlawful discrimination in FY 2022. CSOSA's TCDC and PSA's TCDU provided mandatory self-paced online training courses in the areas of EEO, sexual harassment prevention and the No FEAR Act. These courses were completed by over 100 supervisors and managers and over 500 non-supervisory employees. In FY 2021, 97% of supervisors and managers also completed mandatory self-paced online training in the area of Reasonable Accommodations laws and regulations. In FY 2022, 5% completed this training.

In FY 2022, the Agency continued in its efforts to implement Part J of its Affirmative Action Plan for People with Disabilities, including those with targeted disabilities. The Agency's goal is to strengthen its partnerships with Veterans' and rehabilitation services organizations to reach the Agency's adopted goals of 12% participation rate in its workforce for People with Disabilities (PWD) and 2% participation rate for People with Targeted Disabilities (PWTD).

In order to reach its adopted goals, the Agency remained focused on outreach and recruitment of employees with disabilities in FY 2022. To that end, the Agency continued to utilize a variety of recruitment strategies designed to increase the number of qualified applicants with disabilities and with targeted disabilities. These multi-pronged recruitment strategies, which the Agency will continue to use, include partnerships with the Virginia's and the District of Columbia's Vocational Rehabilitation Services and disability resource centers at local colleges and universities; Workforce Recruitment Program; Operation Warfighter Program; and the Wounded Warrior Regiment, M4Life Program.

The Agency continued working to develop collaborative recruiting partnerships with other community, academic, and governmental groups that reach individuals with targeted disabilities to increase the pool of potential candidates at the GS-11 level and above, including managerial and supervisory positions at grades GS-13 to SES. The Agency continued its efforts to reach a larger pool of potential candidates, including by sending job announcements in real-time to federal, state, and local agencies and organizations serving persons with disabilities and posting job announcements on social media.

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In FY 2022, the Agency continued providing training opportunities and funding for employees to participate in career and leadership programs. While the national pandemic caused by COVID-19 continued to impact the rate of attendance and amount of programming, employees participated in career and leadership programs, including the Aspiring Leaders Program and the Business Professional Program.

Essential Element E – Efficiency

EEO Complaint Trends

In FY 2022, the Agency continued to promote and offer Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) to resolve both EEO and non-EEO inquiries and complaints. Individuals in nine (9) of the 11 EEO precomplaints filed in FY 2022 elected ADR, resulting in an ADR participation rate of 82%. Although none of the pre-complaints were successfully resolved in ADR, participation in ADR in FY 2022 increased by 20% from FY 2021's participation rate of 61%.

Every quarter, the Agency reviewed the complaints data in conjunction with the No FEAR Report to identify potential barriers and complaint trends. The number of formal complaints filed decreased from 8 in FY 2021 to 5 in FY 2022.

In FY 2022, the EEO Office began five (5) new investigations and continued investigations into two (2) prior complaints. The average number of days it took the Office to complete investigations increased from 190.88 days in FY 2021 to 204.00 days in FY 2022, as a result of the complexity of some of the investigations.

Essential Element F - Responsiveness and Legal Compliance

The Agency timely submitted its oversight reports in FY 2022, including the No FEAR Annual Report to Congress, the Federal Equal Opportunity Program (FEORP) report, and the Disabled Veterans Affirmative Action Program (DVAAP) report.

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Workforce Analysis Summary

The Agency analyzed cumulative data from October 1, 2021, through September 30, 2022, to identify triggers that may require further inquiry to determine if barriers to equal employment opportunities for employee groups based on race and national origin (RNO), sex, or disability exist. Where applicable, the Agency's plans for completing barrier analyses are included in this EEO Program Status Report. The Agency's total workforce consists of permanent and temporary employees. The workforce distribution by disability includes permanent and temporary employees as well as employees with "no disability," employees "with a disability," employees "with a targeted disability," and employees who "did not identify" any disability. In this report, when comparisons are made, only the triggers with statistically significant decreases or increases are noted.

Total Workforce

The Agency's total workforce, including permanent and temporary employees, decreased from 1038 in FY 2021 to 1034 in FY 2022, a difference of 4 employees and a net change of -0.39%. In FY 2022, women continued to comprise the majority of the Agency's workforce totaling 666 employees and 64.41% of the workforce. Correspondingly, male employees totaled 368 and comprised 35.59% of the Agency's total workforce. (**Workforce Data Table A1**).

The Agency's female participation rate of 64.41% was above the Civil Labor Force's (CLF) benchmark of 48.20%. The 35.59% participation rate of males in the Agency's total workforce was below the 2018 CLF benchmark of 51.80%. In comparison, as of October 1, 2020, there were 665 females who comprised 64.07% and 373 males who comprised 35.93% of the Agency's total workforce. Between October 1, 2021, and September 30, 2022, the number of female employees increased by one (1), and the number of male employees decreased by five (5).

In FY 2022, Black employees constituted the major racial group in the Agency's workforce, totaling 820 of 1034 employees, or 79.30%. This group decreased by eight (8) from FY 2021, when the group totaled 828 of the Agency's 1038 employees, or 79.77%. The number of employees identifying as Asian, Hispanic, White, and American Indian or Alaska Native increased in FY 2022. Each of those demographic groups increased by one (1). The number of employees identifying as Asian American went from 37 in FY 2021 to 38 in FY 2022. White employees increased to 108 in FY 2022. Hispanic employees increased to 60 in FY 2022. Employees identifying as American Indian or Alaska Native went from one (1) to two (2). The number of employees who identified as being of two (2) or more races remained at 4 in FY 2021 and in FY 2022.

Hispanic Employment

Hispanic employment in the Agency's permanent workforce represented 5.81% (60 of the 1033) employees) of the permanent workforce as of September 30, 2022, compared to 13.00% of the 2018 CLF. Twenty-three (23) Hispanic men represented 2.23% of the Agency's permanent workforce in comparison to 6.80% of the CLF; and 37 Hispanic women represented 3.58% of the Agency's

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workforce in comparison to 6.20% of the CLF. (Workforce Data Table A2).

Mission-Critical Occupation

In FY 2019, the EEOC simplified the process of identifying triggers, and substantially revised and consolidated the workforce data tables by topic. For example, the new A6 workforce data table incorporates data for employees in mission-critical occupations (formerly referred to as major occupations) and applicant flow data for external hires and internal promotions. These new tables make it easier to assess the impact of the Agency's workplace policies on the overall participation and upward mobility of various EEO groups.

The Agency has one mission-critical occupation (MCO) necessary to fulfill its missions, which is the 0101 Social Science series. This job series includes the Community Supervision Officer, Pretrial Services Officer, Supervisory Community Supervision Officer, Supervisory Pretrial Services Officer, and Deputy Associate Director positions. In FY 2022, 595 employees, or 57.60%, of the Agency's permanent workforce were in this Social Science series. Of those 595 employees, 205, or 34.12%, were male, which was below the Occupational Civilian Labor Force (OCLF) rate of 51.50%, and 392, or 65.88%, were female, which was well above the OCLF rate of 48.50%. Black employees constituted 483, or 81.18% of the employees in this series, which was above the OCLF rate of 7.30%. Sixty-eight (68) White employees comprised 11.43% of this series, which was below the OCLF rate of 76.00%. Forty-two (42) Hispanic employees comprised 7.06% of the series, which was below the OCLF rate of 8.30%. However, 27 of the 42 Hispanic employees were women. They comprised 4.54% of the employees in the series, which is above the OCLF rate of 4.50% for Hispanic females. Nine (9) Asian employees comprised 1.51% of the series, which was below the OCLF rate of 4.00%, and one (1) American Indian/Alaska Native employee comprised 0.17% of the series, which was below the OCLF rate of 1.10%. Two (2) employees, who identified as being of two (2) or more races, comprised 0.34% of the series, which was below the OCLF rate of 1.7% for this occupational category. (Workforce Data Table A6-P).

The Agency also has several job series that are important to its ability to do its front-line work of supervising individuals who are released into the community by the court. Those job series are the following: Social Sciences Aid and Technician (0102), Psychology (0180), Social Work (0185), Social Services Aid and Assistant (0186), Social Services (0187), Biological Science Technician (0404), Toxicology (0415), Chemistry (1320), and Vocational Rehabilitation (1715). In FY 2022, there were a total of 80 employees in these job series.

In FY 2022, 42 employees worked in the Social Science and Technician (0102) job series. The positions in this job series were divided evenly between male and female employees with each group comprising 50% of the job series. The percentage of males in this job series was below the OCLF rate of 57.10%, while the percentage of females in this job series exceeded the OCLF rate of 42.90%. Fortyone (41) of the 42 employees, or 97.62%, identified as Black. This was above the OCLF rate of 8.80% for this job series. One (1) of the 42 employees, or 2.38%, identified as a Hispanic female, which was below the 4.80% OCLF rate. (Workforce Data Table A6-P).

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In the Psychology (0180) job series, there were two (2) employees. Both identified as being Black females. This 100% rate of participation significantly exceeded the OCLF rate of 3.90%. (Workforce Data Table A6-P).

In the Social Work (0185) job series, there was a single employee. That employee identified as a Black female. This 100% rate of participation significantly exceeded the 15.00% OCLF rate. (**Workforce Data Table A6-P**).

In FY 2022, 12 employees occupied the positions in the Social Services Aid and Assistant (0186) job series. Nine (9) of the 12 employees, or 75%, were Black males, which was significantly above the OCLF rate of 4.90%. Three (3) of the employees, or 25%, were Black females, which exceeded the OCLF rate of 15.00%. (Workforce Data Table A6-P).

In the Social Services (0187) job series, there were three (3) employees. Each of those employees identified as Black males. This 100% rate of participation significantly exceeded the 4.90% OCLF rate. (Workforce Data Table A6-P).

In the Biological Science Technician (0404) job series, there were two (2) employees. Each of these employees identified as being Black females. The rate of participation of Black females in this job series was above the OCLF rate of 4.40%. (Workforce Data Table A6-P).

Ten (10) employees occupied positions in the Toxicology (0415) job series. Fifty percent (50%) of the positions were occupied by male employees and 50% by female employees. The participation rate of males was above the OCLF rate of 44.60%, while the participation rate of female employees was below the OCLF rate of 55.40%. Four (4), or 40%, of the employees were Black males, which exceeded the OCLF rate of 2.30%. Three (3), or 30%, of employees were Black females, which was above the 4.00% OCLF. Employees who identified as being a White male, a White female, and an Asian female each occupied one position. Individually, the employees in these demographic groups constituted 10% of the employees in the Toxicology (0415) job series. This 10% participation for White males and White females was below the OCLF rates of 29.70% and 35.60%, respectively. The 10% participation rate for Asian females was just slightly below the OCLF rate of 10.90%. (Workforce Data Table A6-P).

In the Chemistry (1320) job series, there were five (5) employees. One (1), or 20%, of the employees identified as a White female, which was just slightly below the OCLF rate of 24.60%. Four (4), or 80%, of the employees were Black females, which was above the 3.50% OCLF rate. (**Workforce Data Table A6-P**).

In FY 2022, there were three (3) employees in the Vocational Rehabilitation (1715) job series. One (1), or, 33%, of the employees identified as a White female, which was approximately half of the OCLF rate of 66.70% for this demographic. Two (2), or 66.67%, were Black females, which exceeded the OCLF rate of 7.50%. (Workforce Data Table A6-P).

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Mission Critical Occupation By Pay Plan and Grade Level

As previously mentioned, the Agency has one mission-critical occupation (MCO) necessary to fulfill its missions. It is in the Social Science series of 0101. In FY 2022, a barrier analysis was conducted by Pay Plan and Grade Levels GL/GS 7 through 15 of the permanent workforce in this series. The analysis revealed that, in the feeder group of Pay Plan and Grade Levels GL/GS 7-9, there were a total of 23 employees, or 3.86%, of the 595 MCO employees in job series 101. Of those 23 employees, one (1) employee, or 4.35%, was a Hispanic female; one (1) employee, or 4.35%, was a White male; 10 employees, or 43.48%, were Black males; and 11 employees, or 47.48%, were Black females. At the GL/GS 7-9 level, there were no employees who identified as Hispanic male, Asian, or American Indian/Alaskan Native or employees who identified as having 2 or more races.

In the feeder group of Pay Plan and Grade Level GL/GS 11, there were 42, or 70.59%, of the 595 Social Science (101) employees. Thirteen (13), or 30.95%, were males and 29, or 69.05%, were females. Of the 42 employees, one (1) employee, or 2.38%, was a Hispanic male; one (1) employee, or 2.38%, was a Hispanic female; one (1) employee, or 2.38%, was a White male; two (2) employees, or 4.76% were White females; 11 employees, or 26.19%, were Black males; and 26 employees, or 61.90%, were Black females. There were no employees who identified as Asian, American Indian/Alaskan Native, or as having two (2) or more races in the GL/GS 11 Pay Plan and Grade Level for series 0101.

In Pay Plan and Grade Level GL/GS-12, there were 406, or 68.23%, of the 595 Social Science series 101 employees. Of the 406 employees, 133, or 32.76%, were male and 273, or 67.24%, were female. Thirteen (13), or 3.20%, identified as Hispanic males. Nineteen (19), or 4.68%, identified as Hispanic females. Fifteen (15), or 3.69%, identified as White males and 25, or 6.16%, identified as White females. One hundred one (101) employees, or 24.88%, identified as Black males. Two hundred twenty-two (222) employees, or 54.68%, identified as Black females. Four (4) employees, or 0.99%, identified as Asian males. Four (4) employees, or 0.99%, identified as Asian females. One (1) employee, or .25%, identified as American Indian/Alaskan Native. Two (2) employees, or 0.49%, identified as females having two (2) or more races.

In Pay Plan and Grade Level GL/GS-13, there were 93, or 15.63%, of the 595 MCO employees. Of the 93 employees, 32, or 34.41%, were male and 61, or 65.59% were female. Four (4) employees, or 4.30%, were Hispanic females. Six (6) employees, or 6.45%, identified as White males. Five (5), or 5.38%, identified as White females. Twenty-six (27), or 27.96%, identified as Black males. Fifty-one (51), or 54.84%, identified as Black females. One (1) employee, or 1.08 %, identified as an Asian female. There were no Hispanic males, Asian males, or employees who identified as American Indian/Alaskan Native or as having two (2) or more races in the Grade Level GL/GS-13 for series 0101.

In Pay Plan and Grade Level GL/GS-14, there were 19, or 3.19%, of the 595 MCO employees. Of the 19 employees, 9, or 47.37%, were males and 10, or 52.63%, were females. Two (2), or 10.53%, were Hispanic females. One (1), or 5.26%, identified as a White male. Two (2), or 10.53%, were White

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females. Eight (8), or 42.11%, were Black males. Six (6), or 31.58%, identified as Black females. There were no Hispanic males, no Asian employees, and no employees who identified as being American Indian/Alaskan Native or as having two (2) or more races at the GL/GS-14 grade level.

In Pay Plan and Grade Level GL/GS-15, there were eight (8), or 1.34%, of the 595 MCO employees. Of the eight (8) employees, three (3), or 37.50%, identified as a Black male and five (5), or 62.50%, identified as Black females. There were no employees who identified as having two (2) or more races or identified as Hispanic, White, Asian, or American Indian/Alaskan Native at this grade level for series 0101. (Workforce Data Table A6-P).

In FY 2022, there were 80 positions in the Social Sciences Aid and Technician (0102), Psychology (0180), Social Work (0185), Social Services Aid and Assistant (0186), Social Services (0187), Biological Science Technician (0404), Toxicology (0415), Chemistry (1320), and Vocational Rehabilitation (1715) job series. The Agency also conducted a barrier analysis as it pertains to these positions by Pay Plan and Grade Levels GL/GS 7 through 15 of the permanent workforce in this series. The analysis revealed that, in the feeder group of Pay Plan and Grade Levels GL/GS 7-9, there were a total of 44 employees, 55%, of the employees in these job series. Of those 44 employees, there were one (1) Hispanic female at 2.27%, 24 Black males at 54.58%, and 19 Black females 43.18%. At the GL/GS 7-9 level, there were no employees who identified as Hispanic male, Asian, or American Indian/Alaskan Native or employees who identified as having two (2) or more races.

In the feeder group of Pay Plan and Grade Level GL/GS 11, there were three (3), or 3.75%, of the 80 employees. Three (3) employees, or 100%, identified as Black males.

In the feeder group of Pay Plan and Grade Level GL/GS 12, there were 13, or 16.25%, of the 80 employees. Four (4) of the 13 employees, or 30.77%, were male. Nine (9) employees, or 69.23%, were female. Three (3) employees, or 23.08%, identified as White females. One (1) employee, or 7.69%, identified as a White male. Three (3) employees, or 23.08%, identified as Black males. Six (6) employees, or 46.15% were Black females.

In the feeder group of Pay Plan and Grade Level GL/GS 13, there were four (4), or 5.00%, of the 80 employees. Three (3) employees, or 75%, were Black females, and one (1) employee, or 25%, identified was an Asian female.

In the feeder group of Pay Plan and Grade Level GL/GS 14, there were two (2), or 2.5%, of the 80 employees. One hundred percent (100%) of the GL/GS 14 identified as Black females.

In Pay Plan and Grade Level GL/GS 15, there were two (2), or 2.5%, of the 80 employees. One (1) employee, or 50%, identified as a Black female. The other employee identified as a Black male.

New Hires by Type of Appointment

In FY 2022, the Agency had a total of 69 new permanent and temporary hires. Eighteen (18), or 26.09%, of the new hires identified as male and the other 51 new hires, or 73.91%, identified as

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females. (Workforce Data Tables A1, A8).

The EEOC has provided Federal agencies with an ongoing Federal benchmark of 12% for PWD and 2% for People with Targeted Disabilities (PWTD) within their respective workforces. Of the 69 permanent and temporary new hires, 36, or 52.17%, identified as having no disability; six (6) or 8.70%, identified as having a disability; and 27, or 39.13%, did not identify if they had a disability. None of the new hires identified as having a targeted disability. (**Workforce Data Tables B1, B8**).

Employee Recognition and Awards

In FY 2022, the Agency provided 1,174 awards, including time-off awards, cash awards, Quality Step Increases (QSIs), and performance-based pay increases. Of the 1,174 awards, 785, or 66.87%, were awarded to female employees, which was slightly above female employees' participation rate of 64.38% in the permanent workforce. Female employees received more than their proportional share of time-off awards as they received 114 of the 163 time-off awards, which was a participation rate of 69.94%. Female employees also received more than their proportional share of cash awards. Of the 977 cash awards, female employees were awarded 652 awards, or 66.73%. (Workforce Data Tables A1, A9-1)

Overall, with regard to awards allocated to employees by race and gender, there were some variations. For example, Hispanic employees received a larger share of total awards in FY 2022 than their percentage representation in the Agency's permanent workforce. Employees who identified as Hispanic comprised 5.81% of the permanent workforce and received 83 of the 1,174 awards, or 7.07% of awards. Hispanic men received 2.47% of total awards, and Hispanic females received 4.60% of total awards, which was greater than their participation rates of 2.23% and 3.58%, respectively. However, these groups received a disproportionately high percentage of awards in the "\$500 and under" category with Hispanic males and Hispanic females receiving 3.88% and 13.59%, respectively. This variance may be explained by the Agency's commitment to Foreign Language awards and EEO awards that are usually approved within the \$100-\$500 range and may benefit some members of this demographic. (Workforce Data Tables A1, A2, A9-1)

The inverse variance is exhibited with the Agency's population of White employees. White men and women received a slightly lower percentage of awards than their percentage representation in the permanent workforce. White employees comprised 10.46% of the permanent workforce and received 118, or 10.05% of total awards. However, White employees received a disproportionately higher percentage of cash awards of \$4,000 and above and performance-based pay increases. For example, 16, or 20.25%, of the Agency's cash awards of \$4,000 and above and three (3), or 25%, of the Agency's performance-based awards were approved for White employees. (Workforce Data Tables A1, A2, A9-1)

The largest demographic group in the Agency, Black females, represented 53.05% of the Agency's permanent workforce. In FY 2022, they received 54.85% of total awards. Notably, this demographic group received 49.27 % of the Agency's cash awards of \$4,000 and above as well as 50% of the

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Agency's combined QSIs and performance-based pay increases. (Workforce Data Tables A1, A2, A9)

Importantly, the Agency's top cash awards (the performance awards) are paid as a consistent percentage of salary based on performance rating. This analysis highlights areas of variance, but the causes of such variance (e.g., why certain employees received a higher percentage of top-cash awards) are likely due to employment demographics (e.g., the grade-levels of certain demographics).

Separations

In FY 2022, 68 employees separated either voluntarily or involuntarily due to removals, resignations, retirements and other reasons (including death and transfer to other Federal agencies) from the Agency. Forty-three (43), or 63.24%, of the separating employees in FY 2022 were female, and 25, or 36.76%, were male. Of the 68 separations, 56, or 82.35%, were Black; 10, or 14.70%, were White; one (1), or 1.47%, were Hispanic; and one (1), or 1.47%, were Asian. Regarding separations by PWD, 52, or 76.47%, of separating employees identified as having no disability; five (5), or 7.35%, did not identify; and 11, or 16.18%, identified as having a disability. Voluntary separations accounted for 98.55% of all separations in FY 2021 and 94.12% separations in FY 2022. (Workforce Data Tables A1 and B1).

Persons with Targeted Disabilities

In FY 2016, the EEOC proposed an amendment to its regulations requiring the Federal government to engage in affirmative action for individuals with disabilities. These changes clarified the obligations that the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 imposed on federal agencies as employers, in addition to the obligation not to discriminate based on disability. This amendment codified a variety of obligations placed on Federal agencies by management directives and executive orders, and added three substantive affirmative action requirements including that: (1) agencies must meet goals set by the EEOC for employment of people who have disabilities as defined under Section 501; (2) agencies must meet sub-goals set by the EEOC for the employment of people with targeted/severe disabilities (hereinafter "targeted") as defined by the Office of Personnel Management's ("OPM's") Standard Form 256 ("SF-256"); and (3) agencies must provide Personal Assistants to employees who, because of disabilities, require such assistance in order to be at work or participate in work-related travel, unless the provision of such services would impose an undue hardship on the agency.

From FY 2021 to FY 2022, the number of persons with targeted disabilities (PWTD) employed by the Agency remained at 14. The Federal goal for PWTD is 2.00%. Given that the Agency is a law enforcement agency, there are certain physical and mental qualifications for employees in the primary MCO position. However, the Agency's goal is to increase its PWTD participation rate to 2.00% by focusing its recruitment efforts on positions that support the primary MCO position as well on positions in the Agency's administrative components that are not law-enforcement related, such as OHR, OHCM, the Office of Financial Management, the Office of General Counsel, the Office of Administration, and the Office of Information Technology. As of the FY 2022 reporting period, the Agency was still striving towards this goal.

In FY 2022, the number of employees in the Agency's permanent workforce who self-identified as

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having a targeted disability was 14, or 1.36%. The overwhelming majority of PTWDs were at the GS-12 and above-grade levels. In fact, of the 14 permanent employees with targeted disabilities in FY 2022, 12 employees, or 85.71%, held positions at the GS-12 through SES level, while two (2), or 14.28%, were at grades GS-11 and below. (**Workforce Data Tables B1 and B4-1 P**).

Applicant Flow

In FY 2022, the entire Agency used USA Staffing as its automated employment platform. Identification of race, gender, and ethnicity was voluntary, and typically, 94% of job applicants self-identified. The quality of the applicant flow data that the Agency received through the employment platform appeared reliable. The Agency used this data to target its recruitment efforts to underrepresented groups in the Agency's workforce and to evaluate the effectiveness of this targeted recruitment effort. Thus far, the process has been working smoothly.

In FY 2022, the Agency continued to have a lower participation rate of Hispanic females in its permanent workforce, as compared to this group's availability in the 2018 CLF. Employees who identified as Hispanic females constituted only 3.58% of the permanent workforce, although Hispanic females participated at a rate of 6.20% in the 2018 CLF. (Workforce Data Table A1).

The Agency's applicant flow data shows that the participation rate of Hispanic females climbed incrementally in FY 2022. Of the 68 permanent hires, three (3), or 4.41%, identified as Hispanic females. However, of the 199 qualified external applicants for the MCO job series Social Science (101), five (5) qualified external candidates, or 2.51%, identified as Hispanic females, although none of those five (5) candidates were selected for MCO positions. With respect to internal competitive promotions for MCO job series Social Science (0101), five (5) of the 87 qualified internal applicants, or 5.78%, identified as Hispanic females. Ultimately, there were 20 applicants selected for internal competitive promotions in this job series. One (1) of the 20 selectees, or 5%, was a Hispanic female. (Workforce Data Tables A1 and A6-1P).

Triggers and Barriers

In FY 2022, the Agency continued to have a lower participation rate of White and Hispanic employees in its permanent workforce, as compared to each group's availability in the 2018 CLF. White employees' availability in the CLF was 67.47%, and their participation rate in the Agency's permanent workforce was 10.45%. Hispanic employees' availability in the CLF was 13.00%, and their participation rate in the Agency was 5.81%. (Workforce Data Tables A1 and A2).

With respect to White employees and Hispanic males, the data suggests that there are no triggers or barriers to the participation of these demographic groups in the SES ranks. Of the 16 SES members, five (5), or 31.25%, were White males, one (1), or 6.25%, was a White female, and one (1), or 6.25%, was a Hispanic male in FY 2022. (Workforce Data Tables A4-1P)

The data for FY 2022 suggests that there may be triggers to the participation of Hispanic females in the SES ranks. The below table shows that the Agency did not employ Hispanic females in the SES ranks

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in FY 2022. (Workforce Data Tables A1, A4-1P, and A6-1 P)

The table above suggests there may be a "glass ceiling" for employees who identify as Hispanic female since the participation rates of these demographic group in the SES fell below the corresponding availability in all benchmarks. A glass ceiling refers to a circumstance in which certain groups encounter obstacles on their way to highest rank, i.e., the SES. The Agency continues to explore whether there are any barriers in the recruitment and/or selection processes for SES. Notably, the Agency had a very small SES with only 16 members in FY 2022. (Workforce Data Table A4-1P)

In addition to the glass ceiling analysis, the Agency examined whether there may be a "blocked pipeline." This refers to a situation where certain groups encounter obstacles on their way up the internal SES feeder pool.

FY 2021 – FY 2025 Plan Requirement to Correct Deficiencies

Outlined below are program deficiencies identified in the Agency's FY 2017 Affirmative Action Plan, which the Agency projects will be addressed as part as of a multi-year strategy.

Plan to Recruit and Hire Individuals with Disabilities

The Agency plans to continue its efforts to determine whether barriers exist for PWD and PWTD in the recruitment and/or selection processes for the mission critical occupational category of 0101 (Social Science) series. This data will be incorporated into the Agency's comprehensive recruitment plan. The Agency is also exploring how to expand its contacts with organizations that serve PWD and PWTD.

Plan to Improve Retention of Persons with Disabilities

The Agency continues to work on its plan to collect exit interview data by disability status and identify reasons highly performing PWD are leaving the agency. The Agency will explore the possibility of conducting interviews to encourage valued PWD who may be considering leaving to remain with the Agency

Identification and Removal of Barriers

The Agency continues to explore the idea of including the requirement to investigate triggers involving the low participation rate of PWD in the mission-critical occupation series 0101 into the responsible officials' performance plans. The Agency also expects to utilize additional sources of data to: (1) identify policies, procedures, and practices that limit PWD's and PWTD's employment opportunities; (2) investigate whether PWD and PWTD are experiencing barriers that either prevent them from applying for and/or being selected for promotions or new hires to the senior grade levels; (3) identify the proportion of mission-critical occupation series 0101 that lead to managerial positions, and if PWD and PWTD have a low participation rate, conduct a focus group with the population to identify impediments to their advancement within the Agency; (4) examine whether any policies, procedures, and practices are motivating PWD and PWTD to leave the Agency; (5) evaluate policies, practices, and procedures surrounding reasonable accommodation requests, career development opportunities, job assignments, performance appraisals, awards, and the work environment; and (6) conduct climate assessment survey, and focus groups.

In FY 2022, the percentage of PWTD in the GS-1 to GS-10 cluster of the permanent workforce was 0.63%, which was a slight increase from the rate of 0.62% in FY 2021. The FY 2022 rate of 0.63% is lower than the expected 2% benchmark, indicating a trigger. PWTD in the GS-11 to SES cluster of the permanent workforce participated at a rate of 1.49% in FY 2022, which was a slight decrease from FY 2021's 1.50% participation rate. The Agency utilizes the EEOC's 12% and 2% benchmarks for PWD and PWTD, respectively, as targets. The Agency communicates information on the hiring of PWD and PWTD as part of its efforts to encourage Program Offices to use Schedule A hiring authorities. In FY 2022, the Agency continued to work with the offices of Equal Employment Opportunity, Diversity, and Special Programs (EEO), the Office of Human Resources (OHR), and the Office of Human Capital Management (OCHM) to improve the participation rate for PWD and PTWD. The Agency continued its campaign to remind employees annually about the importance of reporting and encouraging employees to update their disability status so that the Agency can gain a more accurate count of PWD and PTWD currently working at the Agency and the needs of those employees. In addition, the Agency began discussing its efforts to oversee OHR and OCHM's efforts in (1) assisting in the recruitment of qualified disabled applicants: (2) expanding the use of the Schedule A process (where applicable); (3) assisting in the advertising of any mandatory or optional training programs; and (4) ensuring that the goals and requirements within Executive Order 13548 and Part J of the MD-715 Annual Report are communicated and implemented throughout the organization. In FY 2022, even with limited resources, the Agency continued to utilize a variety of recruitment strategies designed to increase the number of qualified applicants with disabilities and applicants with targeted disabilities, including networking with organizations that serve PWD and PWTD. In FY 2022, the Agency was below the 12% goal of PWD in the GS-1 to GS-10 cluster at 10.76% and the GS-11 to SES cluster at 7.89%. The Agency was below the goal of 2% of PWTD in the same clusters at 0.63% and 1.49%, respectively. The Agency will continue to implement the following multi-pronged and multiyear recruitment strategies in FY 2022, FY 2023, FY 2024, and FY 2025: a. Continue to target recruitment of PWD by reviewing and reinforcing the function of the Selective Placement Coordinator who has responsibility for the staffing and recruitment of People with Disabilities. With the assistance of the Agency's Disabled Veterans Affirmative Action Plan Manager (DVAAPM), the Agency will continue to partner with Virginia's and the District of Columbia's Vocational Rehabilitation Services and national organizations such as: o Disabled Veterans' Outreach Programs; o Disabled Transition Assistance Programs; o Disability Resource Centers at colleges and universities; and o The Agency will explore the potential opportunities/resources of OPM's shared register for applicants with disabilities, designed by Bender Consulting Services. b. Continue to partner with the Workforce Recruitment Program to recruit postsecondary students and recent graduates with disabilities who would be an ideal match for the mission of the Agency for temporary and permanent positions for which they qualify. c. Develop collaborative recruiting partnerships with community, academic, and governmental groups that can reach individuals with targeted disabilities to maximize recruiting from all sources when filling positions at the GS-11 level and above, including managerial and supervisory positions at grades GS-13 to SES. d. Increase the Agency's presence at meetings, conferences, and career fairs sponsored by organizations serving individuals with targeted disabilities to reach a larger pool of potential candidates.

In FY 2022, PWD received awards at a rate slightly less than their percentage representation in the Agency's total workforce. Of the Agency's workforce, 8.32% of employees identified as having a disability, and 8.18% of the Agency's total awards were provided to individuals with disabilities. For example, the Agency awarded 163 time-off awards and only nine (9) of those time-off awards (5.52%) were provided to individuals with disabilities. Of the Agency's highest time-off awards (31-40 hours), 6.25% were provided to individuals with disabilities.
